One Year to Live Report!

The weekend of April 5-7, 2013, SCLMM hosted its 7th One Year to Live Men's Retreat. A total of 31 guys spent the weekend discussing God, their faith, themselves and each other. As happened after the previous 6 retreats, lives were changed, faith expanded, relationships made in an experience like no other.

Just imagine, 31 guys, away from the distractions of the world, getting real with themselves but most importantly getting real with God. One Year to Live is a weekend full of challenges and obstacles, a weekend of prayer but most importantly a weekend of hope. It is a place where guys can simply be themselves, not be judged, and see that we all are kind of alike. We all have had successes, we all had failures and we all need to become deeper in our relationship with Christ.

As the guys sat, listened, talked and prayed, they were able to see and realize that life does not have backward steps. Every step moves us forward. Every step moves us down a path. Men do get to decide the path they take. The path with the most light is the path lit by grace of God through the sacrifice of His son. That does not imply that the path is an easy one. The Godly path has cracks in the sidewalks, roots growing that may cause one to trip and fall. God's path is not the easy walk but rather the way with the most reward as the 31 guys learned, together, in April.

Now you may be thinking, cool story but that is not for me. Quite simply One Year to Live is for the guys that think they need it the most, and most assuredly for the guys that think they need it the least. Guys of all ages, 20's through their 80's, of all faith levels, have attended One Year to Live. Anyone can go. Some quotes from brothers in Christ who attended in April are as follows.

"To see that so many guys have the same or similar problems and concerns that I have. To realize, "That I'm not an Island all by myself." In opening up to tell others, it dawned that I was opening up to tell God. It became so easy to talk to God, not in saying prayers, but in just talking to Him. Asking for His opinion and what direction I should take. He's not dictating to me, but He has placed thoughts in my head that I have never ever thought about before."

"I believe in Jesus, but never much though about God. I think, and the story hit home with me, that I was in line with Jacob. Never knew it or just how it was effecting me, but in November I was diagnosed with PTSD. Meaning that I withdraw into myself and became an extreme introvert. This is something that has gone on for the last fifty years. I closed out everything and everybody from my life, only worshiped my job. Now in retirement, there isn't much for me to be excited about.

That was until OYTL. Wow! What a change has come over me. Even my wife said, "That this change worries her. Can she keep up with me?"

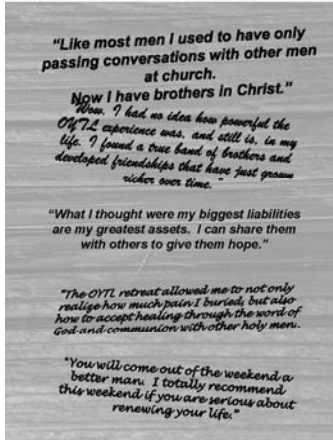
"The feeling that men are capable of loving and nurturing one another. It has opened me to be more open to men about my relationship with God."

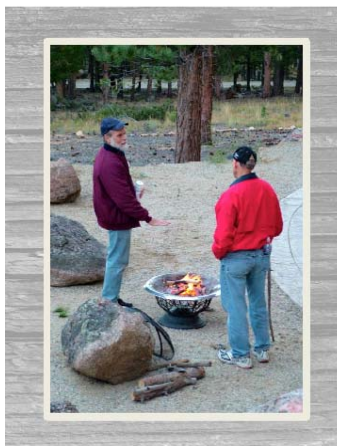

President's Report

What SCLMM Means Me

One of the blessings for serving as South Carolina Lutheran Men in Mission president is the opportunity to go around and visit different churches, SCLMM units and or conference gatherings. I was blessed to be present at the Saxe Gotha Conference Committee of 100 dinner. To see a gymnasium so full of people that care for SCLMM, that donate to SCLMM and that have mission churches in the hearts was, well, I almost cannot describe it in words.

The reason I was so touched to be at that meeting of about 250-275 people, was that I myself am a member at a mission church, Faith Lutheran Chapel in Pickens. I have seen first hand where the Committee of 100 dollars go, what they build and how they bring people closer to God.

The Sunday school lesson was how God taught me to read the Bible. In preparing for Sunday school lessons then and since I constantly find myself looking up verses about many subjects, most of which have nothing to do about that Sunday school lesson. Those Sunday School lessons at a tiny mission church brought the Bible into my mind and heart.

It was a mission church that has given my 7 year old son the confidence to not only pray and say grace before family meals but also in front of over 100 people at the SCLMM Convention. My daughter was confirmed in a mission church. My father, who was not a fan of organized religion as we so often hear, attends every week as able, is on church council, takes care of maintenance at the church and has even served as a staff member at the One Year to Live retreats after attending himself.

So you may ask, "Do my Committee of 100 dollars matter?" Oh yes, they matter, they matter a lot. I cannot express to you in words the appreciation, gratitude and love my family has for South Carolina Lutheran Men in Mission and our mission church. It has brought all of us closer to God and what a ride it has been.

The exciting thing is that I am just one man, part of one family. But there are so many other men and their families at our other mission churches and synod authorized worshipping communities that have the same story. While we may be different men with different families, we are all part of God's family, and our God home is our mission churches. So yes, your dollars matter. On behalf of myself, my family and the families that make up our mission congregations, thank you, thank you, thank you for what you have given.

 some deserving student to obtain a quality education.

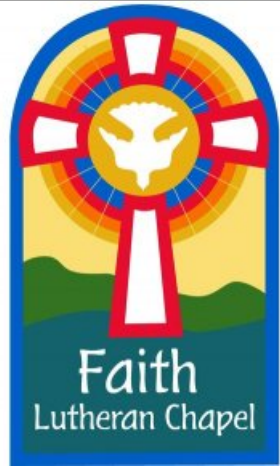

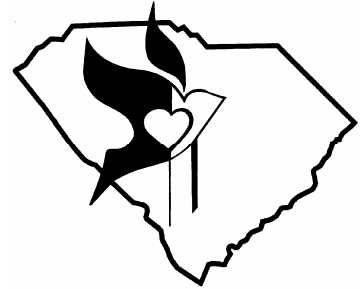

Worshippers Go From Beach to Eat Pancakes Easter Sunday

It was cloudy and still dark early Easter Sunday morning when more than 700 worshippers were greeted with the music of guitar player and singer Gary McCormick of Oceanside Village. Soon they heard Pastor Brad Bellah welcome and invite those on this Atlantic Ocean beach to follow-up the singing; a Jesus Christ Resurrection message and communion with a drive several miles away to Shepherd of the Sea Lutheran Church for breakfast pancakes served by Lutheran Men in Mission. Although the engine of Lutheran Men and the church seem to run on pancakes, kitchen volunteers probably did not have enough pancake batter for all 700. More than a hundred did shared breakfast in the fellowship hall, located in Garden City on Highway 17 Business at the intersection of the Garden City Connector to the west and Pine Ave. on the oceanside. Lutheran men also serve pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, which was commonly known as Pancake Day, when perishable ingredients had to be used up before the fasting period of Lent began in Britain and the Commonwealth.

When the local Lutheran men's group meets on the fourth Monday night of the month, frequently the menu choice--other than hotdogs--is pancake, especially when there is left-over batter to utilize.

Lutheran men are not unique and not the first to serve pancakes. Historians say pancakes are probably the earliest and most widespread cereal food eaten in prehistoric societies. Pastors frequently quote the Ancient Greeks as root-word sources for Biblical text. Lutheran men could refer to Greek text as well. Fifth Century BC poets Cratinus and Magnes mentioned pancakes called τηγανίτης--tēganitēs--a word deriving from τήγανον--tagēnon or "frying pan." Back then they were made with wheat flour, olive oil, honey and curdled milk and served for breakfast, says Wikipedia.

The pancake's shape and structure varies worldwide. A crêpe is a thin Breton pancake cooked on one or both sides in a special pan or crepe maker to achieve a lace-like network of fine bubbles. A well-known variation originating in Southeast Europe is Palacinke, a thin moist pancake fried on both sides and filled

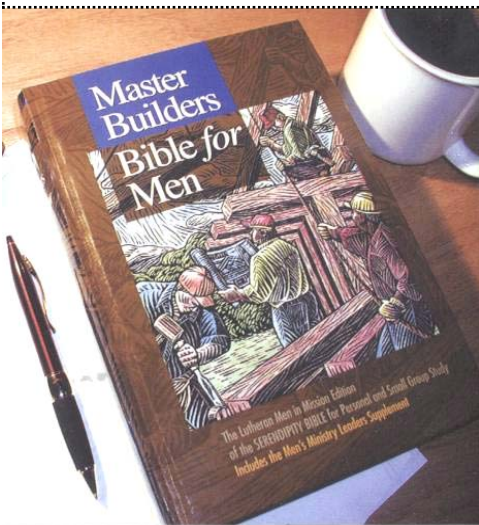
